PASSING THE LEGACY: DEPENDENCE ON GOD

Psalm 127 and 128 both talk about family. They are both called *Songs of Ascents (Shir Hamma'loth) in* the superscriptions. This meant that they were sung by pilgrims whenever the people ascended to worship the LORD God in the Temple in Jerusalem.

Remember that Hebrew poetry has a feature that is unique. It is called *parallelism.* There are four basic types, three of which occur in these psalms:

- 1. Synonymous similarity of ideas between the 1st and 2nd lines (v.1)
- 2. Antithetical opposite or contrasting thoughts (1:6)
- 3. *Synthetic* 2nd line develops the idea of the first (v.2)
- 4. *Emblematic* one line is a metaphor for the other (v.4)

Psalms also have thematic structures. *How would you title each of these five stanzas according to their themes?*
